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
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Spiritual Food for The Journey...

"LISTEN! JESUS IS TELLING YOU SOMETHING"

This weekend like last weekend God is trying to tell us something. God is speaking to us, and teaching us something important for the transformation of our lives. We find Jesus in the Synagogue, the house of prayer and He's teaching. Before we can get into the power of what Jesus is doing then and for us now we need to look first at Deuteronomy.



We begin with a powerful word by Moses. These words of Moses in the "Book of the Re-telling" of the Law, Moses says: " A prophet like me will the LORD, your God, raise up for you from among your own kin; to him you shall listen.". Moses is clearly the most important figure for the Jewish people. And he is saying a prophet like him shall you listen to. Now as we read further look what Moses says about Him:

"I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their kin, and will put my words into his mouth; he shall tell them all that I command him.

Whoever will not listen to my words which he speaks in my name, I myself will make him answer for it."

Now see this, Moses was the one the people listened to, he is still the primary voice for the people of Israel and a true Rabbi's teaching goes back to Moses. So this word of Moses saying that instead of him, rather this new prophet from among you, He is the true one to whom you shall listen. This prophecy is fulfilled in Jesus. Today we find Jesus in that place of prayer and He is teaching in a new way, in a powerful way. He is the Divine Word, He is the Logos or Verbum. Jesus teaches with an authority that is amazing because He is the very spoken word of God that is sent forth.

Notice, the unclean spirits know Him. They too are present. This is important for us to remember that then and now the demonic, dark spirits find their way into the church. The divisive ones, the ones that only speak negative and seek to tear down rather than build up. The push back, the devils' advocates. How on earth do we give advocacy to the devil? There is no room nor need for his negativity, division and disruption in church.

Let us seek to listen to the voice of Jesus. I learned something new, that push back in us that goes against us doing the hard things. That push back that says no it's too risky, it's too scary, we can't do anything new, we can't risk it. This is the very place and voice of Jesus. God never calls us to do what's easy, what's safe or what's necessarily sure. Rather like in telling His disciples to go out to deep waters to lower their nets for a catch, even though they thought they knew better, they obeyed and God brought forth an abundance.

There is story after story where what seems too hard and impossible God makes great things happen. Jesus is telling us to Listen to Him. Are you Listening?

God is Trying to tell You Something! Are you Listening?

Before we get into todays scriptures from Jonah and the Gospel of Mark, I want us to first enter into an understanding that God still speaks clearly and frequently to us. The question is are we listening and are we willing to say Yes? We often think that God only spoke to people back in the Biblical Times. Maybe we think yes God spoke to the prophets, like Isaiah, or Jeremiah, or God talked to Moses, or Job, or God talked to Mary, and Zachariah, or yes, God spoke to His Son Jesus upon His rising from the waters of Baptism, but that was then and this is now.

I cannot tell you as a young priest how often God was talking to me through His people, through my religious superiors, through spiritual direction. There is one clear instance where I was too afraid to do what God was calling me to do. I was 31 years old, and newly ordained just two years and I was being asked to take on a pastorate, St. Bernard Parish in Oakland. The Deacon and his wife, the parishioners were ready to back me, but I was too afraid. Everyone had seen that I was ready and able, they saw gifts in me that I couldn't see myself. But God was talking to me, and I refused to listen. After I left the parish and a new administration took over, let's just say things were not going well, so bad the parishioners were picketing at the Diocese because what followed just didn't work. But, after much trial and error I finally let go to what was clearly God's calling and direction speaking to my life. Meaning, it wasn't my planning. I had nothing to do with it and all I would say is Yes, I will do whatever I am asked and accept it as God's will.

Now, let's look at Jonah. God called Jonah to go to the greatest enemy of Israel, the Assyrians to their capital of Ninevah and preach a message of repentance. Now Jonah was completely against it, he was not about to go deep into enemy territory amongst a pagan people and preach to them. So like many of us, he decided he was going to run as far away from God as possible to the south of Spain to escape God. So, he set sail for Tarshis, and what happens, a great storm tosses the boat so much so they are about to sink and they draw straws. Jonah knew it was due to his running from God and he told the pagan men to toss him into the sea. They do as he asks and immediately the wind and waves stop. Jonah is swallowed by a large fish and the pagans come to believe in the one true God. Jonah finally decides to do God's will and does as he is told and all the people down to the cows all repent.

Sisters and brothers, in the Gospel Mark, we find Jesus, much like Jonah, proclaiming a message of Repentance, for the Kingdom of God is at hand. The call to repent is a call to change our focus, to shift our entire selves to seeking to hear, to know and live a Christ centered life. Jesus' proclamation has also an invitation to follow Him. The refocus of our hearts and our minds is to direct ourselves toward God. When our focus is misguided God continues to invite us. He invites us to a new way of seeing and living, as well as understanding our relationship with him. The life of repentance now places our focus on Christ not on the things that distract us. The refocusing of our selves is a daily journey. Each of us gets distracted, out of focus and we are always invited back. This is our hope, our joy and our desire for living. Allow our lives to be caught up in Christ and share His love and good news with others.

FR. FRANCIS HEALY, SJ

Patrick Francis Healy, SJ (February 27, 1834 – January 10, 1910) was an American Catholic priest and Jesuit who was an influential president of Georgetown University, becoming known as its "second founder". The university's flagship building, Healy Hall, bears his name. Healy was posthumously recognized as the first Black American to become a Jesuit, to earn a PhD, and to become the president of a predominantly White university.

Healy was born in Georgia to a family that produced many Catholic leaders. His mother was one-eighth Black and his father was a White Irish emigrant. Under

Georgia law, Healy's father technically owned his wife and children as slaves. Healy and his siblings were sent north by their father to be educated at the College of the Holy Cross, and Healy continued his higher education at the Catholic University of Louvain, where he received his doctorate in philosophy in 1864. He returned to America and started as the chair of philosophy at Georgetown University.

Healy was elected president of Georgetown University in 1873 and appointed rector the following year. Seeking to transform the institution into a modern university, he oversaw a period of extensive growth. He increased the prominence of the sciences, raised the standards of the School of Medicine, and oversaw a rapid expansion of the Law School. He also constructed a grand building that became known as Healy Hall, which left the university in substantial debt. In 1882, he went to live with his brother, James, the Bishop of Portland, Maine, and the two traveled extensively throughout Europe. Afterwards, Healy returned to pastoral work in Rhode Island and New York City, before returning to Georgetown, where he died.
