This weekend I would like to reflect with you on the Subject "Know Your Purpose, Let Your Life be a living Sacrifice."

Today we find Jesus arriving at His hour and we are reminded of the purpose for which he came. We are reminded that the purpose for His coming and His direction is Jerusalem. As I reflect on the scriptures this week I am reminded of an old Spiritual Director Fr. Felix Eckerman, SVD. Fr. Felix used to remind me that "The main thing, is the Keep the Main thing, the MAIN THING." You see Jesus' hour has now arrived and nothing is going to deter him from his path and direction. Some "Greeks", these are persons who have come the feast of Passover who were Jews that were of the Diaspora, Greek speaking Jews or Hellenists. They had likely heard about Jesus and were curious to learn from Him and probably had question. Jesus is focused on the Keeping the Main thing the Main Thing, namely going to Calvary, entering His passion, death and ultimately the resurrection. So there is no time for frivolous encounters and conversations. When told by Phillip that some "Greek" speaking Jews wanted to see Him, Jesus shifts directly to His Purpose. Jesus responds, "The Hour has come for the Son of Man to be Glorified." Jesus is ultimately Glorified in Him like a grain of wheat dying, He gives the ultimate sacrifice in His dying so that He might rise again, glorified by His Father in Heaven.

Like Jesus we are called to Keep our eyes on the Prize, to discover and know God's purpose for our lives and to remain on that path. Like Jesus our lives must also be a lived sacrifice, we are called to die to ourselves so that we might live for Christ. This becomes the heart of the message for us this week. Jesus says: "However loves his life loses it, but whoever hates his in this world will preserve it for life eternal." The question arose in our scripture sharing this week, what does this mean? Why should we hate our own life? What Jesus is telling us is that we are not called to live for ourselves, to promote ourselves, to seek our own good, but rather like Jesus, we are called to die to ourselves our will and our way and to allow Christ to live through us. Our lives have meaning when they are lived in giving and service to others. This is where true purpose and happiness lies, living a life that impacts and lifts of the lives of others.

Recently a parishioner shared how she and her organization were working with the children from Hamilton Elementary. She spoke with great passion and excitement of all that they are doing to help the lives of children in need. She shared with hope and enthusiasm further engagement and impact for the lives of the children in our neighborhood and community. Here is where the meaning of today's scriptures come alive. Each of us is called to this responsibility, simply coming to St. Augustine to get what you can get out of the service, or from the parish and going home is not only insufficient, but it is also unacceptable, the true Christian must seek to give their lives for others. Each day is a dying to ourselves, of giving our lives in service to a sister who is struggling, a brother who is in need, a child who is lost or hurting, a young person who is discouraged. We must come out of ourselves, our own desires and make a difference in the life of another. To take up our cross and follow Jesus, must mean a daily journey with Him, though the pain and struggles, a diurnal trek that causes us to look back upon our day and see how we have made a difference in others lives. How is someone's life better because we encountered them, looking past their appearance and circumstance to see them in a better and greater way because they have met you, encountered you and you made a difference in their life.

## Federated Colored Catholics Organization (FCC)

The Federated Colored Catholics (FCC), originally the Committee against the Extension of Race Prejudice in the Church, then the Committee for the Advancement of Colored Catholics, was a <u>Black Catholic</u> organization founded in 1925 by <u>Thomas Wyatt Turner</u>. It was a kind of <u>spiritual successor</u> to <u>Daniel Rudd</u>'s <u>Colored Catholic Congress</u> movement (1889-1904), providing an organized voice in an era of nearly unchecked <u>anti-Blackness</u> and <u>systemic racism</u>. After a hostile takeover, it folded in the 1950s.

The FCC was originally founded in December 1925 as a small group advocating for Black uplift, and later expanded within the local area before becoming a federated group of chapters in various other cities.

They engaged in a number of social justice efforts, including a concerted push for more Black priests, who at the time were extremely few. (US seminaries had been entirely closed to Blacks until the late 19th century, and to a continuing extent thereafter.) The FCC's main target in this regard was the Society of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart, a mostly White order that ministered specifically to African-Americans. At the FCC's meeting in 1928 in Cincinnati, several of the first openly Black Catholic priests were mentioned in the program, including Frs. Augustus Tolton, John Henry Dorsey, SSJ; Charles Uncles, SSJ; Stephen Theobald, Norman Dukette; Joseph A. John, SMA; and Augustine Derricks, OSST.

The clashes between the FCC and the Josephites would eventually lead to the expulsion of FCC firebrand Marcellus Dorsey (brother of Josephite priest <u>John Dorsey</u>) from the <u>Knights of Peter Claver</u>, a Black Catholic fraternal organization the Josephites helped found in 1909.

Two White Jesuit priests, <u>John LaFarge Jr.</u> and William Markoe, later became major backers of and leaders in the FCC, eventually pushing the organization into a more interracial direction—against Turner's will. The group would eventually splinter over this conflict, with LaFarge establishing the short-lived Catholic Interracial Council of New York, which spawned several other chapters.

The FCC would itself die off in 1952, eventually succeeded by other national Black Catholic organizations such as the National Black Catholic Congress.
