When we make Jesus first in our life:

This weekend we gather with the Christian Church around the world to commemorate Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, but also we recall His passion, suffering and death. As we gather we wave our palm branches, we sing our Hosanna song we remember that what Jesus did, He did for us and for all humanity for all time. Jesus willingly, decisively, and intentionally enters into this moment of His own free will to save us from sin and death. 

James i: Lyke O Til, i'flo

James Patterson Lyke was born on February 18, 1939 in Chicago, IL – the youngest of seven children born to Amos and Ora Lyke. He grew up in Wentworth Gardens, a public housing project on Chicago's Southside. From these modest environs, he went on to become a Franciscan friar, a Catholic priest, a teacher, a pastor, a bishop of the Church, and at the time of his untimely death in late 1992, he was the highest ranking African American in the Roman Catholic hierarchy.

He attended St. George Catholic School and his desire to become a Catholic grew so strong that he eventually brought his Baptist mother and all but one of his siblings into the faith. After entering the Franciscan Order, he was ordained a Catholic priest on June 24, 1966. His first assignment was in Cleveland, Ohio, where he taught at Padua High School. While in Cleveland, Father Lyke was also active in the community and led the local Operation Breadbasket efforts for civil rights. After the 1968 assassination of Martin Luther King in Memphis, TN, he requested to be sent to Memphis, where he served for nine years as pastor at St. Thomas Church (now St. Augustine). He was the first African American Catholic priest to serve in the state of Tennessee. He served as president of the National Office for Black Catholics and was a close advisor to Bishop Carroll Dozier. Also while at St. Thomas, Father Lyke became the first African American chaplain for Marriage Encounter. He authored the filmstrip marriage enrichment program, "Black Married Love."

In 1977, he was assigned as chaplain of the Newman Center at Grambling University. The assignment turned out to be short-lived. Pope John Paul II called him to the episcopacy as auxiliary bishop of Cleveland, OH. He served as the Urban Vicar there until 1990, when he became the Apostolic Administrator for the Archdiocese of Atlanta. On June 24, 1991, James P. Lyke, OFM, Ph.D. was installed as the fifth bishop and fourth archbishop of Atlanta, GA.

Archbishop Lyke also coordinated an outstanding committee of African American liturgists and musicians in the production and publication of the highly regarded African American Catholic hymnal, "Lead Me, Guide Me" in 1986.
