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## Spiritual Food for The Journey...



WHY ARE YOU TROUBLED?

This weekend as we continue in our celebration of Easter, we find Jesus again appearing to his disciples. As we look to the 24th chapter of Luke's Gospel we find that the disciples who recognized Jesus in the breaking of the bread, the Eucharist, have returned from Emmaus and they "recounted what had happened on the way, and how Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of the bread". As they are speaking, Jesus again appears to them. What is striking here is that Jesus appears in His timing, when He decides. You see if you're like me you want things done in your time frame, according to your will and way. You decide the who, when, what and where. Well, you see church Jesus does not conform to our timetable but rather He acts in accordance with His will and plan.

The resurrection is the central truth of our Catholic faith. *Jesus is truly Risen; He is Risen indeed*. The reality of this truth the Gospel tells us today is cause for "**incredulous**" joy. This incredulous means something that is unbelievable has happened, the unknown, and unheard of has taken place. You see Jesus not only does the undoable, He does the unthinkable and inconceivable, the undefinable and it is for this reason that the disciples are joyful and amazed.



You see they had no real reference to go on. In the ancient world it was believed that when you died, that was it you returned to the earth. There was also the belief that when you died your body and soul separated and your soul went to "*Shol*". This Jesus who comes into their midst shows that He is alive by eating with them, it is really the Master and Lord, just as He ate with them at the Last Supper. He shows them ghosts can't eat, but He does, because He is Risen.

All that said, so "why are you troubled." Jesus the Risen One is here in our midst, He is here in each heart that accepts Him and believes in Him, He is here in our gathering. Jesus is even here in the midst of our fear, sadness, and pain. We are to be a living testimony that proclaims the incredulous, that believes the unbelievable, conceives the inconceivable, that does the undoable. We proclaim to all around us that we together, "can transform dark days into bright tomorrows."



## lige St. Gelasius I

Pope St. Gelasius I has been remembered as the most prolific writer while serving as the head of the Catholic Church for at least its first five centuries. Pope St. Gelasius has been remembered as the pope who spelled out the political authority of the pontiffs for the next thousand years of ecclesiastical and secular history, especially in the geographical

boundaries that formerly comprised the late Western Roman Empire.

Gelasius worked for many years in Rome as an assistant to his predecessor <u>Pope Felix III</u>. St. Gelasius was so accomplished a writer for the day that Felix kept him busy drafting papal documents in his service. In fact, both before and during his papacy term, Gelasius I wrote so many documents that he became known as the most prolific writer of the church's leaders for the next five centuries at least.

Of his surviving writings from over 1,500 years ago, we still have many of his over 100 treatises and letters. In one of these, he famously stated that "There are two powers by which this world is chiefly ruled: the sacred authority of the priesthood and the authority of kings." This key declaration would define the authority of the papacy for many centuries to come.

Pope Gelasius was tireless in his efforts to combat what he saw as heresy on all fronts. In the still surviving East of the Roman Empire, he battled with the Patriarch of Constantinople concerning the dual nature of Christ as both divine and human at once.

Pope Gelasius was only the Roman pontiff for four short years. He was already 82 years old when he ascended to the office of the papacy in succeeding his predecessor Pope Felix III. It was not a great shock four years later when he died naturally of old age at a respectable 86.
