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Spiritual Food for The Journey...

This week we arrive at Good Shepherd Sunday. As we are in the Easter season, but today we here one of the "I Am" statements. For many the image of shepherd may seem strange or unfamiliar because they don't see shepherds. I remember well as a theological student, during my oversees mission experience, I often saw shepherds with their flocks. In Mexico in the state of Hidalgo shepherding was the role of the women and children. The shepherd led the flock, but also at moments walked amongst the sheep and at moments also walked behind the sheep. This gives us good insight into the role of the shepherd.



Jesus says "I Am" the Good Shepherd. He as the Good shepherd listens, guides, and

cares for the sheep. Jesus models for us a shepherd for pastors and bishops how we are to lead. A true shepherd guides the sheep, the shepherd walks in front of the flock because of the role and calling to set the direction for the flock, to see ahead what the flock cannot see. A true shepherd ought to have the spiritual sight to look where the sheep cannot or may not be able to envision. But a good shepherd cannot just stay ahead of the sheep because he can become disconnected and even irrelevant to the sheep. For this reason, as a shepherd, we need to walk amongst and with our sheep. In the words of Pope Francis "**To smell like the sheep**" To share in their joys and sorrows, to celebrate achievements but to also be present to them in their, pain, grief or disillusionment. A true shepherd has to at times be one with the sheep. I also noticed that shepherds also would be behind them sheep, encouraging, pulling them back, their when they are lost and wondering away and astray.

Pope Francis says

"The Good Shepherd is meek. A pastor who is not meek is not a good pastor. He has something to hide, because meekness makes itself seen as it is, without defending itself. In addition, a good shepherd is tender; he has that *tenderness of closeness*, he knows the sheep one by one, by name, and he takes care of each one as if it were the only one, to the point that when he returns home tired after a day of work, and realizes that one is missing, he goes out to work again in search of that one, and carries it back home with him, on his shoulders (see *Lk* 15:4-5). This is a good shepherd, this is Jesus, this is the one who accompanies us all on the path of life. And this idea of the pastor, this idea of the flock and of the sheep, is a Paschal idea. The Church, in the first week of Easter, sings that beautiful hymn for the newly baptized. "These are the new lambs". Similar to what we heard at the beginning of the Mass. It is an idea of community, of tenderness, of goodness, of meekness. It is the Church that Jesus wants, and He guards this Church."

This is a Beautiful weekend in that it also reminds us of God tender love for us as church. As Pope Francis mentions in the above quote. We have not been left alone, the Lord watches over us, protects us, loves us and through the gift of good shepherds to care for His flock. Let us also pray for our shepherds our pastors and bishop. We pray that God give them the insight and vision to lead the flock gently, as they walk into new pastures and besides still waters as the psalmist states. We are not left alone to fend for ourselves, nor to figure things out on our own. God is present to us through Christ our Good Shepherd and He continues the care of of sheep by placing men over the flock to Shepherd through listening, guiding and caring for the people of God. I ask my flock to pray for me that might at times walk ahead of the flock providing a guiding light into a new direction. Allow me to walk with and amongst you so that I might identify with you, learn from you, share in your joys and miles stones in life. May also be present to you to hold and comfort you with tenderness, mercy and love. May I as your shepherd walk behind you, to bring you back to the fold, to encourage when you've fallen away, to lift you when you've fallen and journey with you so that when lost you may find your way back to the Father's house where there is peace, love and joy

NAACP TEENAGER OF THE YEAR



1916: Committee for the Advancement of Colored Catholics

Led by Thomas Wyatt Turner, the Committee for the Advancement of Colored Catholics forms during World War I to care for black Catholic servicemen, neglected by both the Knights of Columbus and the black YMCA.

After the war, the group broadens its focus. Its advocacy gives birth to a new national forum for black Catholics. Its purpose: "Collection of data concerning colored Catholics, the protection of their interests, the promotion of their welfare, and the propagation of the faith among colored people."

The U.S. bishops, despite requests from Rome to act on behalf of blacks during the race riots and lynchings of 1919, avoid the topic at their first annual meeting.

In response, the committee publicly urges the bishops to denounce discrimination and consult with black Catholics, saying, "At present we are neither a part of the colored world (Protestant), nor are we generally treated as full-fledged Catholics."
